WHAT SHOULD I DO *BEFORE* THE SHOWCASE?


1. Define your goals: what do you want from this experience?

- Build out your professional network
- Learn about possible career paths
- Look for job opportunities
- **2. Research** employers attending the event
 - Main products/services/activities
 - Press releases/company websites & blogs
- **3. Prepare** your day-of questions, *lots* of questions
 - Prepare your Elevator Pitch and resume (general, specific)
 - Prepare questions for participating employers (general, specific)
 - Be prepared to talk about why you have interest in a particular career

DURING THE CAREER SHOWCASE

- *Relax!* This is a low-stakes opportunity to meet & learn from other people who are excited to meet & learn from you too!
- Be friendly and attentive stay in the moment, focus on the conversation and people at hand
- Ask questions & listen carefully -- jot down a few notes if you like *but* remember it's a conversation, not a survey
- Try to focus on an enjoyable, engaging discussion for both parties that opens the door for interacting again in the future. Be sure to get contact information for later outreach!
- At the end, consider asking what questions you should have asked but didn't...

WHAT SHOULD I DO *AFTER* THE CAREER SHOWCASE?

Send thank-you messages to your new contacts!

- Refer to specifics from your conversation so they can easily remember who you are.
- Clearly communicate a next step:
 - Follow up on an application, in process or submitted
 - Informational interview
 - Referral to other contacts to learn more
- Make a plan to stay in touch going forward
 - Connect on LinkedIn & other networking platforms
 - Favorite on Handshake & other job boards

Remember:


Career Transitioner Resume Questions to Ask

What overall impression do my resume and cover letter give?

- Do I look like my new field?
- Do I aspire to be in my field or am I already in my field?

What comes first on my resume?

Should I highlight my degree? My experience?
 What's most relevant?



Should I break my experience into 2+ sections?

• E.g., "Computer Science Experience" and "Additional Professional Experience"

Can I add field-specific signal words in headers and job titles?

- Intern -> Cybersecurity Research Intern
- Student Worker -> Data Structures Teaching Assistant

Can I beef up my experience with unpaid projects, volunteering, and fieldwork in my new field?

How can I network to increase my odds of breaking into a new field?


